Recently, in the third-grade science lesson, the students focused on learning how to do coding by using ozobots (*think* mini robots). The students do the coding on the computers to program the ozobot to move in straight lines,

turn, spin, and rotate. Once they have coded on the computer, they hold the ozobot up to the computer monitor and the coding on the computer transfers to the ozobot. They then turn the ozobot loose and

see how well they have coded. It really is very cool to watch!!!



This past week, at morning assembly, students from first through 8th grade daily watched a short video of someone with a *disability*. Many of these disabilities dealt with physical disabilities. After they watched the video, they were asked a series of questions by Mrs. Beller to get them to reflect on the challenges the person(s) with the disability had as well as their gifts, and talents. She led them to reflect on what they had learned about *themselves* through the person(s) with the disability.

A good example of what happened with one of the videos is the following experience: the students had experienced a mother and child that had been born with no hands and the video showed how they dealt with their situation. They were able to eat, brush their teeth, write, etc. like anyone else. Later in the day, Mrs. Beller, visited some of the classes, and she challenged each student to write his/her name on a lined piece of paper using only their feet to hold the pencil and paper. You probably can imagine the comments she heard. "This is too hard!!" "I can't do it!!" It's impossible".



She then stopped the students. She wanted them *to become aware* of what they were saying. As you can imagine, the comments were very negative. Students were asked the question: "What does negative talk do to our brains?" As she told the students: "It's okay for things to be hard – most new things are difficult and hard to start – the more we practice and the more we are positive, the more we will grow."

She then asked the students about the individuals (mother and child) in the video about *their situation?* The students responded on how positive, upbeat, and happy the mother and child were. Mrs. Beller then encouraged the students to become "more positive" in their speech as they tried the exercise again. Amazingly, as the students redid the project of writing with their feet, one could start to pick out letters and names! And, their words were more positive.

Why have we spent the time of doing this "disability week"? The goal of this program was to see if we could assist the students to grow in their view of how people "who may be different" from them (in various ways, including physically) and that, in reality, they are the same as they in so many ways! Through videos, through discussions, through reflections and similar exercises in the classrooms as was done with students trying to use their feet to write. Our Mission says we are encouraging and leading the students "to grow as Disciples of Christ". Varied "experiences" (like videos) along with discussions, including reflections, similar exercises and prayer can be ways God assists a person to grow in discipleship and compassion.
